

One reason for that could be to do with what I wrote about last month: "Thou knowest how busy I must be this day." Our popular spring clean was carried out on 27 April, and despite it being a cold and blustery morning, we had enough hardy volunteers to cover most areas of the village. Thank you to all who braved the elements for the sake of our beautiful parish, and I hope you enjoyed your complimentary treat at the village shop. Happily, it was the general opinion that there was less rubbish to collect this time, and we believe that the introduction of an autumn clean in addition to our spring clean, has contributed to this.

Many of you may be aware of the current hybrid planning application 19/00822 for 12 almshouses and 13 market houses at the Feoffee site in Walkhurst Road. We held our planning meeting to consider this and other current applications on 17 May, and this was attended by residents from Walkhurst Road with concerns about the development. The Parish Council's comments on this application can now be viewed on the TWBC website. The target TWBC determination decision date is 18 July 2019, and I would urge you to post your comments, either positive or negative, on the TWBC website well in advance of this date.

We have had three applicants for our current vacancy on the Parish Council (for which the closing date for applicants was 18 May) and hopefully we will be making our decision on the successful candidate in June.

And a reminder that the opt-in garden waste service collection begins from 30 September - sign up with TWBC to ensure your garden waste collections continue. If you sign up before Friday 2 August you will receive a £10 discount on the £52 annual charge. https://beta.tunbridgewells.gov.uk/refuse-and-recycling/garden-waste

I believe Benenden becomes an even more beautiful place during these months of increased verdancy. Enjoy the warmer weather and longer daylight hours while you can.

Just a Thought



Stepping up to the shoe challenge

I have my mother's feet - that is, quite large and too wide - and buying shoes was always a trial. Until recently, when manufacturers finally woke up to the genuine need and the financial possibilities of the enhanced foot, the choice was what fitted, not what looked good. When I was a child there were school shoes, plimsolls for PE, sandals for the summer, and wellies of course (but at least they fitted). That was all.

When the subject of shoes comes up, most men sigh and don't see the problem. Black or brown, smart or casual, a pair of trainers and a pair of boots - done. However most women would agree that shoes finish off an outfit - but at what cost. On a visit to my son in Japan a few years ago, my daughter and I had the chance to get togged up in kimonos with obi, white face-paint and a fancy wig. This was completed with an amazing pair of high, wooden-ridged clogs called 'geta'. These are worn to raise the wearer out of the mud and protect the kimono. It is no wonder that the ladies so dressed totter with the smallest of steps - anything else would lead them to fall flat on their faces.

Back to the present. Recently I needed to find a pair of shoes to go with a special dress. Armed with a photo for colour matching I wandered round the shops of Canterbury. I thought I had found just the pair. They were even immediately comfortable. But, when matched with the dress at home, the colour just didn't work. More searching of shops, but to no avail. So I turned to the internet. Now, out there is a world of almost infinite choice, but are the colours true? What is the texture like? How do you know they will fit? I ordered some but the colour was not right and they weren't that comfortable.

Such was my introduction to the world of online shopping for shoes and clothes. It is not like shopping for electrical goods or stationery or household equipment or books or grandchildren's toys - this is personal. I think that I have a lot to learn and am already beginning to understand why the Post Office in Benenden's seems to have to deal with a large number of 'return parcels'. I finally found my shoes in a small shop in Tenterden.

Nowadays how many pairs must one travel with? Shoes are heavy and you can only wear one pair at once. On a trip home from St Helena we were planning to go via the Sydney Opera House, a beach in Tahiti, the mountains in the south of South America and arrive in an English winter - and I had only 20kg baggage allowance. Would trainers be acceptable at the opera?

Maybe the youth of today have the right idea, with a pair of trainers or clunky boots deemed suitable for every occasion. At least they fit all shapes of feet.



Canterbury Cathedral Choristers at St George's





Friends of St George's

If you asked someone locally to picture
Benenden in their mind, the chances are
that one of their first images would be of St
George's Church at the head of the village green.
Benenden would not feel the same without it.

A little over 20 years ago the Friends of St George's was established as a registered charity to help ensure that the church building and its churchyard continue for many years to come. One of the principal aims was that people who are not churchgoers, but who value the building and its setting, could help to maintain the fabric. The building is expensive to maintain, like most ancient buildings, and there is no regular support from central government or Church of England funds - its future lies in our hands.

Since being founded, the Friends have raised over £90,000 towards maintaining the fabric. The biggest single contribution was in 2015, when £20,000 was given towards the repair of the roof of the church tower, which was in a poor state, with rainwater coming through into the bell chamber below, and serious deterioration in the stonework. As with many Grade 2* listed buildings, there always seems to be something to repair! In addition to work which is immediately apparent, like the tower roof, every five years the building is inspected by the appointed architect and this gives rise to a shopping list of repairs, the cost of which is usually substantial.

Each year the Friends raise around £5,000, of which about half comes from putting on events and half from subscriptions. At our annual general meetings we have some interesting talks by local speakers on very diverse topics - from local birdlife to the life of a prisoner of war on the Burma Railway.

If you are not a member of the Friends and would like to help preserve the church for tomorrow, please do join us. The suggested subscription is at least £10 per person per year, though we encourage people to give more if they can. 
Two significant BVT events are scheduled for Monday 3 June: the start of work to install the new playground in Benenden, and the Trust's first annual general meeting of members.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

First phase of consultation now closed

On 23 February we launched the Rough Draft Plan at a meeting attended by over 130 people. Copies of the plan were handed out; we placed a stock in the Parish Office for collection and copies in the community shop for people to browse over their coffee or tea. The plan was also posted on our website alongside copies of the presentation delivered at the launch meeting.

By the time the six-week consultation period closed on 6 April we had gathered over 30 pages of comment and suggestions from residents. We have also held meetings with some landowners (perhaps notably Benenden Hospital and Benenden Almshouse Trust) and some developers who wished to discuss aspects of the plan in more detail.

The Rough Draft Plan has been sent to Tunbridge Wells Borough Council (TWBC), neighbouring Parish Councils, Natural England, Historic England, and the High Weald AONB for their comment. A Strategic Environmental Audit of the plan is underway by Government-funded environmental consultants called AECOM. A meeting has been arranged for 31 May with the Head of Planning at TWBC to discuss the draft plan in some detail.

This rough draft is just the start of a long consultation process. The NDP Steering Group will review the feedback from residents, landowners, developers and the statutory bodies. The feedback and advice from TWBC will obviously be of particular importance as TWBC are about to publish a new Local Plan for delivery of housing throughout the Borough. Once we have digested the key points, we will decide what changes we should make to both the content and proposals within the plan. We will also be reformatting the plan to reduce duplication and hopefully make it easier to


read and understand. This will become the 'Regulation 14' draft plan. It will be subject to a further six-week consultation period, where all stakeholders can seek further change or clarification.

The Regulation 14 draft will be amended following the stakeholder input and republished as the 'Regulation 15' draft. A further phase of consultation follows, giving stakeholders an opportunity to make representations direct to an independent examiner who will rule on issues and may insist on final changes to the draft plan. This consultation will also be six weeks long - a timetable will be provided for each step on our website and through the pages of this magazine.

With both the Regulation 14 and 15 consultations it is important to note that feedback should focus on whether the plan complies with planning regulations and guidelines. The NDP team have to act within the rules and guidelines set out in Borough and National Planning guidelines.

Once our revised, revised, revised plan passes examination it will be subject to a referendum. All residents of voting age at the time can then decide whether to support or reject the plan. My hope is that by the time we publish our final plan around January 2020 all of you will understand the proposals, protections and pitfalls and no one will be able to say, "I didn't know what I was voting for ...".

Conkers, gobstoppers and the Frankfurt opera

Former Iden Green resident Paul O'Donovan shares a second helping of memories

On my first day at Benenden village school, Dad, already headmaster and who would teach me at various intervals up to the 11-plus, was out in the yard at the back playing conkers with some of the top class lads - what a likeable headteacher did in those days. Unfortunately, I was standing too near to one of father's swings that missed his opponent's 'cheesey' completely and hit me in the eye, producing a wonderful black one and tears to boot. We still had a chuckle over that until his passing at age 94 in October 2012.

Apart from the gang at Oakfields that also attended the school, there are other names that might spark readers' imagination. The gatehouse to Benenden Girls' School was inhabited by the Bridgelands; Cherryfields was home to Graham Moore and also to his pal by the name of Freeman, who I remember as always having a runny nose. Moving down towards the 'Bull-and-beyond' end, we had the Burtons (Barbara was my absolute fave at

age six), Julia Backhaus, Jillian Stannard, Deidre Hadaway before the move to Iden Green, and the Potters down Walkhurst Lane. Mrs Leggett also lived just off the main drag.

Grown ups? There was Albert Stannard, who staggered past the school every morning with a yoke on his back and two pails of milk in the balance, Fuggle of bus fame, Rawling the butcher and Cherry Orchard, who kept horses on the farm on the top of Hilly Fields. Nowadays the 'corral' is home to sheep.

Lady Ledgard lived in the large house and grounds between the school and the cricket pavilion (Memorial Hall) together with her major-domo Danny Sullivan who, being one of Benenden's few Catholics, was a great friend of our family and most important for us kids as a source of Clarnico Mints. Mrs Pett had the sweetcum-newspaper shop where we could buy gobstoppers, sherbet fountains or mint humbugs for a threepenny bit. The post office was manned by a Mr Ledger, I believe, and the barber, sporting a pole, rampant, from the shop front, was Mr Baldwin.

I have been living in Germany now for the last 40 years and, amazing as it may seem, have met two very special, now elderly, female friends of my Californian wife who were both, in the years between 1947 and 1952, in and around Benenden.

Anna Reynolds, a mezzo-soprano who in her day wooed the Metropolitan Opera in New York, had been a pupil at Benenden Girls' School, subsequently returning there to teach. She married Jean Cox, the great Wagner Heldentenor of Bayreuth fame, and became my wife's vocal trainer during her ten-year stint at the Frankfurt Opera.

Ingrid Schleep, from Kärnten in Austria, spent the years 1947-49 as maid to Brigadier General Yorke at Summerhill House on the Smallhythe Road out of Tenterden. Today at 85 her English is still excellent and she is an avid reader of the Maisie Dobbs detective series written by the Hartley born-and-bred Jacqueline Winspear, who admits to having had a pint in the King William when home from California.

I'm sure I've forgotten more than a few folks by name who were influential to school and village life during this era, but if readers could fill in a few gaps, then feel free.

Speedwatch

The dangers of tailgaters

In a recent article, the village's Speedwatch chief Gregg Stapley asked us all to consider our own speed, and referred to the 'follow my leader' mentality, whereby drivers blindly follow the car in front, whether it is breaking the speed limit or not. You will no doubt find that if you drive within the speed limit you will find yourself the victim of the driver behind tailgating you. It is worth mentioning that tailgating is in itself an offence and could lead to points on the driver's licence, a fine, or in severe cases even a ban.

If you find the driver behind is tailgating you, what is the best way to deal with it? Firstly, stay calm. The driver is clearly trying to make you go faster, but you should of course resist the urge to do so. Remember he or she will not take the points on your licence or pay your fine for you if you are caught. Do not allow yourself to be forced into driving dangerously.

If you are in a line of traffic and are not the front driver, you should gently drop back from the car in front, allowing a four-second gap instead of the recommended 'two-second rule'. This gives you more time to react to changing road conditions and do so more safely, as the driver behind clearly has left no space for thinking and reacting.

Many drivers now are opting for in-car cameras, with a sticker in the back announcing that 'You are on CCTV'. Even without actually having a camera this sticker can be a good deterrent. Tempting as it may be to brake and 'teach them a lesson' this could in itself be dangerous and inflame the situation. You may also feel tempted to pull over and 'let them pass'. This does get them off your bumper, but also rewards their bad driving.

Taking the next turning is a good way of getting rid of them - after all they didn't know that you weren't going that way anyhow. You can then proceed more safely with the mild inconvenience of having to get back on course.





Gentle thoughts of asparagus

Inspired by the author Charles Lamb's view in the early 1800s that 'Asparagus inspires gentle thoughts' I made my way to Lower Ladysden Farm to wander through their asparagus fields and select some choice stalks. Run by the Kember family for the last 55 years, the farm is just outside Goudhurst with beautiful views over the local hills, and supplies to restaurants and shops (including Benenden's) nationwide.

Today brothers Steve and Chris Kember and Chris's niece Suzie run the farm and this year most of its 35 acres are turned towards producing asparagus, strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, new potatoes, courgettes, summer squash, spring onions, carrots, garlic, and 20 different types of pumpkins and gourds.

The farm is open seven days a week to the public to 'pick-your-own' (PYO), which is popular with locals, who visit from April to October (see the website for details on what's growing when). Not only can you gather exactly what you need, it's also a lovely spot to take the family and picnic. If you don't have the time, then you can buy freshly picked produce. A new, large and very stylish farm shop opens on 8 June,

stocking their wide range of home-grown produce.

On the day I visit, Suzie is busy washing and trimming

asparagus. "Over the last few years we have definitely seen an increase in demand for quality produce that is local and grown hand-in-hand with nature," she says. "We try and cater for everyone, from PYO, to shops, restaurants, Covent Garden and bespoke orders for events."

Meanwhile, even when the Kember family aren't providing us with good things from their country larder, they don't let the grass grow under their feet - they grow maize instead and cut a wonderful, large-scale Maize Maze every year to raise money for charity. It opens in mid-July and finishes in September and this year the pattern will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Moon landing.

Returning from Lower Ladysden with an armful of the precious green spears, I recalled hearing that a 16th century Arabian love manual carried an asparagus recipe for its aphrodisiac properties. Unfortunately, I couldn't find the recipe, despite extensive Googling, so why not try one for asparagus mac 'n' cheese with bacon crumble from Lower Ladysden's Facebook page that I expect has much the same effect.


Bird Notes

How the mystery of the Cuckoo's eggs was solved by Chance

Nearly 100 years ago, in 1921, a 12-minute film stunned the world and filled cinemas on both sides of the Atlantic. A Cuckoo had been filmed laying an egg in a host bird's nest, putting to bed a long debate in the ornithological world. There had been plenty of sightings of a Cuckoo with an egg in its mouth and one theory was that it laid its egg elsewhere and deposited the egg in the nest. The opposing theory was that the Cuckoo laid its egg in the nest and then took a host egg away so that the host bird wouldn't notice. The former theory was backed up by the fact that a Wren, whose domed nest would make it very difficult for a Cuckoo to lay an egg, was sometimes the host. How this film was made, and the hundreds of hours of dedicated fieldcraft involved, makes a fascinating story.

It all started at Pound Green Common in the Wyre Forest in the West Midlands, where Edgar Chance ran a family chemicals business and was an obsessive egg collector who became fascinated with Cuckoos and their host species' nests. In the summer of 1918, he and several colleagues found 14 parasitised nests and at the same time established that there were two female Cuckoos holding territories.

Because there were slight differences in background shade and markings between the two females, he was able to determine that ten eggs were laid by Cuckoo A and four by Cuckoo B. The host species was Meadow Pipit in all 14 nests, despite Skylark, Tree Pipit, Linnet and Yellowhammer also breeding on the common. Finding ground-nesting birds is extremely difficult as the nests are usually well hidden under tufts of vegetation. I have frequently flushed pipits and larks from their nests sites when walking through suitable habitat in the breeding season, without being able to find the nest, despite some determined searching; so I admire the fieldwork skill of Chance and his colleagues.



Chance collected all these nests and, by examining the embryos, he was able to determine that Cuckoo egg and host eggs were at the same stage of development and therefore the Cuckoo must be watching the nest to assess hatching times. With a Meadow Pipit laying on average four eggs (one a day) the Cuckoo has only a short window of opportunity to carry out its dastardly deed.

By checking nests every day, Chance found out a Cuckoo egg takes 12 days of incubation to hatch compared to a Meadow Pipit's 13.

The following season Cuckoo A returned, much to Chance's delight, and he found 18 parasitised nests that summer, again all Meadow Pipits. By monitoring these nests he was able to establish that Cuckoo A laid on every other day. Despite all this time in the field he didn't witness an egg being laid. He assumed it must be very early in the morning, similar to when the pipits lay.


On checking as early as 3.45am, he found the Cuckoo egg already in the nest. Therefore, the Cuckoo must have been laying in the afternoon/evening and he and his colleagues concentrated on watching the female Cuckoo, who would be hidden in a tree, sometimes up to three hours at a time, maybe 100 yards away from the target nest. Most of her laying took place between 3pm and 6pm. She would glide down to the nest, remove an egg with her beak and lay her egg in the nest. The whole exercise took about ten seconds, after which she would fly back to her perch and consume the stolen egg.


Chance now had everything in place for possible filming. The next season, and to his great relief, Cuckoo A returned once again, and by using two hides and two cameramen he was able to film seven layings during the season. These were the main focus of the film which gripped the world in 1921. Cuckoo A laid her eggs on the following dates, aided by Chance 'restarting' some of the breeding attempts of the poor Meadow Pipits. (May 11, 13, 16, 18, 20, 22, 24, 26, 28, 30, June 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, 15, 17, 19, 21, 23, 25, 27 and 29). How the Cuckoo could keep track of so many nests to lay at the right time and how Chance managed to keep up with her deserves admiration on both counts.

All these nests and their contents were kept by Chance, with all the dates accurately recorded. Modern research has shown that Cuckoos will do their own restarting by consuming a clutch of eggs and then watch the host pair rebuild nearby. The record number of eggs laid by a Cuckoo without man's help stands at 25.

It should be noted that Chance's fieldwork methods would be breaking present-day laws. In fact his obsession for egg collecting never left him and he collected clutches of some very rare birds and was eventually thrown out of the Ornithological Union.

In Your Garden

Summer pots and early staking

I have got into the habit of buying my summer bedding slightly earlier in recent years - and have found it a very worthwhile task. If I leave it too late the best ones have been snapped up by savvy gardeners (which, if I am organised, is myself if I may say so). However, the drawback with early purchases is where to keep the plants until they are hardened off and ready to go outside, so unless you are lucky enough to have covered outside space, this can be tricky. This is where a roll of fleece can be handy, but I would recommend using a double layer - it makes all the difference if a frost is forecast (works on vegetables too).

To vary the display each year I try to buy (or grow) at least one plant in my summer arrangements that I haven't used before. This year it is a heliotrope. I have usually passed them over as their foliage is quite heavy looking and it has a rather solid habit, completely different to the froth we expect from summer bedding. But it has combined very well with my other selections (see illustration above) and I am very happy with it.

I include a herb, usually mint, too - this can go back out into the garden afterwards plus you can harvest a handful of leaves on passing for an excellent and refreshing cup of mint tea. I bought 'Moroccan' mint this year - I'll see what the flavour is like as I normally buy the very ordinary (and very invasive) garden mint, which is delicious in tea and has a lovely fresh green colour to the foliage. Thyme is another herb that mixes well in summer pots.

Onto the subject of staking. This is another task that seems a bit pointless when nothing is flopping in the borders - but if you can get the stakes in now whilst the plants are halfway, then by the time they are really needed they are almost covered by foliage. I try my best to use the same material for all my supports, or at least the same type of metal for bought items and then twiggy hazels for the rest. Years ago, I made the mistake of cutting hazel branches in the spring thinking 'they would be perfect'. After I'd pushed them into the ground, most of them had rooted by the end of June! If you are going to coppice your hazel (or anything similar), I suggest you get this done in the winter months and leave them in a bundle somewhere dry. If you cannot find your own garden source, then try a local woodsman, who's bound to have an endless supply at a very reasonable price.


