Motor vehicles: expensive, polluting, damaging, noisy and dangerous. Historians will look back in astonishment upon their ubiquity in our age. But rural public transport is practically an oxymoron and with services being lost at ever-increasing rates, a car is no longer a luxury but an essential tool, permitting country dwellers a share in the conveniences modern life affords.

Developers recognise our reliance on personal transport. How many more vehicles will be plying the lanes around Benenden once the TWBC building programme has been completed? Some say we must maintain our roads better in order to aid the passage of vehicles, whilst others would say we should widen our narrow thoroughfares. I don't agree. Society has pandered to the car long enough.

Our paths, for example, are often used as semi-off-road parking. That our less-mobile neighbours, perfectly entitled to walk our pavements unhindered, frequently discover great lumps of steel plonked in their way, should outrage us all. Then there's the damage. If the grass verges by the recreation ground continue to serve as a car park, it will permanently disfigure the village. And some kerbstones, (for example, those outside the community shop) are rattling around like loose teeth.

The Street is wide enough for cars to park on both sides of the road. It may restrict traffic flow but in a village where the Speedwatch programme has been logging an average of 62 speeding offences every five days, that's not a bad thing. A bonus could be that owners of lorries the size of Leeds Town Hall might decide that the trip from Felixstowe to Frankfurt need not take in the B2086.

Of course, the Parish Council could put up signs to remind us that pavement parking is anti-social but I feel certain that none of us would wish to add to the almost suburban visual noise that unnecessary signage creates. Far better that we simply respect one another's space and park on the road, not the pavement.

Rector's Letter



Have the heart to say 'yes'

Last month I wrote about 'Caring at Christmas ... and beyond', and the care that we can give one another as community. Well, now is the 'beyond' and January is traditionally seen as a time of new starts and, of course, the dreaded New Year's resolutions. Personally, I do not sign up to the need to have a resolution. They are far too easy to break and then feel despondent or guilty about. So, no New Year's resolution for me, but the start of a new year is a good time to think about something new you might like to do or try.

So, here is a thought: could the new thing you want to do or try be connected to the community; to helping people; to caring about someone other than your immediate family? Could it be getting involved with youngsters? Or, if they are not your thing, getting involved with oldsters? Or, if they are not your thing, there are plenty of people in the middle who would value company.

In September we launched 'Blend' in Sandhurst, the after-school group for children aged II-14 in school years seven, eight and nine. We regularly get 15-18 youngsters turning up for a couple of hours on a Tuesday from 4pm at the Mission Church. They play table tennis, air-hockey, pool, table football, games on Xbox, and have refreshments, a chat and a laugh together. It is great fun. I still have a heart for this to happen in Benenden as well; I know there is a need. I have an offer of a helper and I have an offer of funding, but I need someone with a heart to make it happen. Could that be you?

This month in Benenden sees the launch of the 'Hello. How are you? club', a drop-in café/social place, in the Memorial Hall (see Tracy's article page 9). Initially it is being held every three weeks, and we'll see how the need develops. It's simply a safe warm place to gather for a couple of hours, with company if you wish, or on your own if you prefer, and have a coffee/tea/cake (free or make a donation). Sit and read a book; have a chat; whatever you want and in the company of others. I have a heart to do a Drop-in Café in the Mission Church in Sandhurst, maybe weekly (similar to the Toddler Group, but you don't need a toddler!). Just a time and space together with others. I need someone with a heart to make it happen. Could that be you?

On Saturday 30 November our new Bishop of Dover, the Rt Revd Rose Hudson-Wilkin (formerly chaplain to the Speaker of the House of Commons) was installed at a lovely service at Canterbury Cathedral. In her sermon she encouraged a community spirit and a heart to say "yes". Yes to thinking about others; yes to helping others; yes to building our community. At the start of this new year, look to do something new; and when the opportunity presents itself, just say "yes".

'Mind the carpet! Don't bring the mud in,' she scolded as he returned.


'Never mind that, there's water covering the road and it's coming up from the river. We should go now before we are cut off!'





Neighbourhood Development Plan

Responding to your feedback

The Regulation 14 version of Benenden's NDP was published on 25 August 2019 and the sixweek consultation period was extended after we encountered delays in printing the plan (for those without access to the internet version). The consultation period ended at the beginning of November.

I am pleased to say we had a great response to this phase of planning. Although our site allocations had not changed since we presented the Rough Draft Plan earlier in the year, much of the text and key policies had been updated following feedback. Now the review process is underway once again. In all we received input from:

- 5 Landowners
- 2 Developers
- 14 Statutory Bodies
- 22 Residents from Benenden Village
- 31 Residents from East End
- 6 Residents from Iden Green

As you may expect, comments from statutory bodies (Kent County Council, Tunbridge Wells Borough Council etc) focussed on planning policy. Input from some residents also made comments on policy, but most of their feedback concerned the location of the sites allocated for housing development.

As outlined in previous contributions to the magazine, the BNDP concluded that none of our 20 sites put forward for development is ideal. In a perfect world we would find a number of small brownfield sites, outside the AONB but adjacent to existing shops, work, public transport and leisure facilities. Unfortunately, most sites close to the amenities in the centre of Benenden are greenfield and of course, inside the AONB. They also border the conservation area or ancient woodland. The sites at East End are outside the AONB and brownfield but are two or three miles from many amenities. So, we will try to take a balanced judgement through the review and once again look at our allocations.

To this end a separate group of parish

councillors and NDP volunteers has been set up to review all input and to recommend changes to the plan. Their role is to make sure our plan conforms to planning policy, regulations and guidelines. 'Locality', a government funded agency has set out the following key points:

- Any comments received by the end of the consultation period must be considered conscientiously
- All representations need to be considered, but it is legitimate for the Neighbourhood Plan body to take a different view
- A planning judgement needs to be taken
- Decisions on whether or not to amend the plan, and the reasoning behind them, should be recorded. This information will need to be incorporated into the consultation statement
- The Parish Council will need to agree the modifications and approve the resulting draft of the plan for submission to TWBC.

The review should be completed by midlanuary and amendments made by the end of January. We will also engage an independent consultant to offer final drafting advice. This amended document becomes the Benenden NDP Regulation 15 Plan. The Parish Council needs to approve the plan and send it to TWBC.TWBC will review and suggest further changes if required by Local Authority policy. Once TWBC and the Parish Council have agreed on the final wording the plan will become the Regulation 16 version. This Regulation 16 Plan will be submitted to an independent examiner who will undertake a further consultation with stakeholders and has the power to instruct TWBC and the Parish Council to make further changes if the examiner believes national planning policy has been ignored.

Residents of Benenden will get the opportunity to vote on the final plan after the examiner has approved it. Based on current progress and despite a great deal of work by volunteers on your behalf, I believe this will be in late summer 2020.

Someone once said "it will be all over by Christmas". But which Christmas? My genuine hope is by next Christmas!



Benenden Hospital news

We've just trialled a new anaesthetic at the hospital that will allow hundreds of patients to be discharged just a day after having hip replacements instead of two-three days currently.

Andy Chandler, 69, from Rolvenden, was the first patient to have the Pericapsular Nerve Group (PENG) Block following his operation in November. Amazingly, he was able to walk from his bed with the aid of a support frame just two-and-a-half hours after his operation. His case was featured as part of a presentation to the World Congress of Orthopaedic Surgeons last month.

We believe we are the first private hospital in the UK and only the second behind Epsom in Surrey to be trialling this new anaesthetic. At the hospital, we want to adopt the most innovative and up-to-date anaesthesia techniques that lead to shorter hospital stays, patient satisfaction and an overall great outcome from their operation.





Not all our pupils headed directly home for Christmas. Some girls are out exploring the world, with one group skiing in France and another trekking in Nepal. Ben Fogle, whose talks of adventure last month were so inspirational for the girls, would be proud.







losing a boot in the mire along with our dignity.

The spoil from the primary school foundations had recently been spread across the field, but clearly no thought had been given to drainage, and if the contractors knew that two public footpaths crossed the field, they showed absolutely no sign of it.

If you walk a dog round here you get pretty used to tramping through the winter mud. But in a decade of exercising the hound I've never actually got to the point where I really didn't think I'd get out. The problem is that you know that if you do fall flat, you really might not be able to get back up.

- The lack of urgency in making change
- The need for a pathway to net-zero carbon before 2050 with milestones
- Greater focus on seamless integration needed between sustainable modes
- The need for greater focus on integrating transport and planning





How many times have you been happily doing something at home when you have been interrupted by the phone ringing? My guess is that this has become a regular occurrence. What is more frustrating is that the call is from a total stranger who claims to wish to help you.


The pitch from the caller varies: they have found a problem with your computer; they are from your bank and want help sorting out a



fraud; they want to offer you the opportunity to be an early investor in a set of shares that will outperform the market. All the stories are, of course, a fabrication.

The source of the calls varies as much as the tale they pitch.

Some are from overseas and are clearly reading off a script; some from noisy offices based somewhere in Europe; others, often more plausible, are well rehearsed and from the UK. The thing they all have in common is that they



While many scammers do use the telephone, there are just as many who use email, mail or, in fact, turn up in person with just the same intent: to find a victim. They aren't choosy about who they target, either - they are true equal opportunity thieves. Young, old, male, female, rich or poor, they simply don't care.

However, they do regard some groups as easy targets. According to Age UK, 43% of older people - almost five

million people aged 65 and over - believe they have been targeted by scammers. Those with dementia are at particular risk.

"Because older people are more likely to live on their own, and are often lonely, they become targets for fraudsters," says Age UK. In one study, it was found that 27% of single people responded to a scam, compared with less than a tenth of their married counterparts. In England, the number of people over 65 living on their own is expected to rise from 3.5 million in 2015 to just under five million by 2030, and the number of people with dementia is projected to rise from 850,000 now to 1.14 million by 2025. This means that in future, significantly more older people could be at risk of being scammed.

According to figures highlighted by several organisations working to combat fraud, they cost the UK economy somewhere between £5-£10







billion a year. While the overall cost is truly staggering, the cost to the individual victim can be heartbreaking.

Again, according to Age UK: "Once people realise they have been scammed, they often feel ashamed to have been duped and so

will seldom report what has happened. It is estimated that only 5% of these crimes are ever reported.

It doesn't stop there: "Once a person falls victim to one con artist, their personal details are often added to what is known as 'suckers lists' and sold on to other criminals, so they are targeted again and again.

"The impact can be devastating - people who have been defrauded in their own homes are two and a half times more likely to die or go into residential care within a year."

FIGHT BACK

Like so many crimes, scams do best when they are hidden; bringing them out into the open starts to make them less effective, less scary. It is something the whole community can take part in, raising awareness and being a resource for those who may be targeted by the scammers.

The National Trading Standards Friends
Against Scams project gives you the opportunity
to take the fight back to the scammers. It may
be that you just want to know more, or perhaps
you could take a lead as a Scam Champion and

support the community more directly in highlighting the issues and making it harder for the scammers to succeed.

Benenden bells: 300 years and still ringing

The history and the future of a great village institution, founded in 1719

In the year 1418 the Archbishop of Canterbury directed his suffragan bishop John of Sora "to dedicate our new church at Benenden, and to bless four bells therein". This is our present church, whose outer walls still stand, although we do not know any details of the bells. However, in 1621 the Whitechapel Bell Foundry supplied a ring of five bells to hang in the great detached timber tower. These were a ring to match the tower, with the largest (tenor) bell weighing 27 cwt - if they were still in existence today, they would be the heaviest ring of five change-ringing bells in the world, beating the present heaviest, East Pennard in Somerset, by some margin.

This great tower, with its impressive ring of bells, together with much of the roof and interior of the church, was totally destroyed by fire in 1672 in the "great Storm of Thunder and Lightning" commemorated by a plaque near the north door. It is remarkable that the church was

rebuilt only a few years later, to include a stone west tower, which however could only be completed to less than its present height before funds ran out; but in 1718 the tower was completed and in June 1719 a new ring of six bells ordered from Whitechapel. One bell of this ring of six still survives as she was cast in 1719 - the fifth bell of that ring, now the 11th of the present ring of 12.

It seems evident that the new ring of six bells were very far from satisfactory tonally, one bell being exchanged for a new one free of charge, and several recasts being made during the 18th century. In 1801 the treble bell of the ring of six was found to be cracked, and was recast, and two more treble bells added to make a full octave.

The first full three-hour 'peal' of 5040 changes was rung shortly after, and in 1820 and 1821 four further peals were rung, duly commemorated on boards on the tower. It is clear that the 'Gentlemen of Benenden' as they were called, were a band of unusual ability under their conductor John Hatcher, a local highly skilled clockmaker. Their performances included a world first, of Oxford Bob Triples, a 'method' still rung today; and they are also recorded as having rung

a full peal at Goudhurst, a heavy ring of bells still regarded as difficult today.

By 1926 the old oak frame of 1801 had worked loose and was stiffened with iron tie rods, and the sixth bell recast. This was the installation that the writer came to as a young

ringer in the 1960s. The oak frame by then had worked loose again, being seriously weakened by death watch beetle attack, and the bells hard to ring, especially for learners. So it was decided to rehang the entire ring on ball bearings in a completely new steel frame, work carried out by Taylors of Loughborough, who retuned the whole ring to the note of E flat. An indifferent and poorly toned collection of bells was transformed into a magnificent singing octave, easy to ring and good to learn on. They sprang to immediate fame as one of the finest rings in the Southeast, and were soon in demand by expert ringers for peals.

However, they were still quite heavy metal and less than ideal for young beginners to learn on; and by the generosity of many sponsors of the parish, in 2003-4, four new treble bells were added to make a full ring of 12 bells together with a new flat sixth bell which, used instead




of the normal sixth, gives a true light octave from bells two to nine, ideal both for beginners of any age and for advanced musical performances by expert bands.

Bells cannot ring themselves, however. Of equal importance has been

the continued willingness of Benenden people to come forward and be trained in our unique English music of change ringing, over the past 300 years. This isn't an historical art stuck in the past, but a still-developing, live performing music that makes the fullest possible use of the latest technology for training, such as our superb simulator that allows a ringer to ring a real bell, but with an on-screen 'virtual band' that never makes mistakes or wants to go off to the pub!

Nor do you need to be a 'church' person or to have any religious belief or practice, though it's fine if you do. Most of us ring because we enjoy the challenge of making music in this unique way and the social life, the fellowship and friendships of the worldwide community of ringers, that results from the teamwork of this highly skilled musical craft. Our training is second to none, honed over 40 years of practice in teaching the art. Unlike many towers whose

bells are now silent, we still have an active band, but only if we continue to train new ringers to make up for inevitable natural losses. Will our famous bells still be ringing 50 or 100 years hence? This will only happen, as it always has, if you, the people of Benenden and readers of this magazine, decide that they will. Spotlight on: Penny Wilmot

A very stylish lady who contributed much to Benenden. Ruth Clark celebrates the life of Penny Wilmot, who died in November, aged 93.

Eunice Arbuckle, better

known by all her friends and family as Penny Wilmot, was one of those people who was

deeply involved in village life during the 33 years she lived in Benenden. She and her husband John arrived here in 1974 when they bought Fuggles Garage at the bottom of the village green.

Penny was born in Shepherdswell in Kent in 1926 and she fell in love with playing the piano early on. During World

War II, aged just 15, she joined Duke and his Accordion Band and every evening for four years they entertained the in-transit troops in Dover, known then as 'Hellfire Corner'. She demonstrated her mettle and courage, describing the experience thus: "It was great fun, especially when the air raid warning would sound, and we all had to rush down to

the shelter to continue playing and singing." She wore a white suit with red piping, made especially for her, with underwear made from parachute silk. Not surprising then that she remained a very stylish lady all her life and was always perfectly coiffed.

Just after the war she married John Wilmot, who nicknamed her Penny, and they went on to have two children, Susan and Jonathan, and six grandchildren. John was a Royal Marines

Commando during the war and became an accountant afterwards. His business took the family all over the world and they spent time in Southern Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe), East Africa, Zambia and Antigua, before they put roots down in less-tropical Benenden.

When John and Penny bought Fuggles it was a petrol station and car sales and repair business which also provided a local taxi service; but, ever intrepid, they started Kent's first rural bus service. In her leisure time, Penny was involved in the Iden Green WI, the Guides and was a

founder member of the Benenden Players, which began in 1981 - she was made lifetime president in 2006. She played piano for all the village shows, accompanied by great friend and saxophonist Dr Cyril Cooling.


As Penny and John's business grew, they built a new bus depot at Apple Pie Farm and in 1985

converted the cottage on the garage site in Benenden into Wheelwrights House, where they continued to live. The couple retired in 1989 and when John died in 2006, Penny moved to Cumbria for a short time before returning to the area in 2010.

Penny's daughter Susan lives in Crete and her son Jonathan in Australia. Still keeping links with Benenden

is her grandson Tom, who has just completed his law studies and currently works at the Bull.

When talking to people about Penny, the words that come up the most when they describe her are 'stylish, kind and generous'.
A lovely legacy.

How bright is the future for British fizz?

Benenden's wine expert takes a look at the economics of the thriving domestic sparkling market

Christopher Merret (16 February 1614-19 August 1695), was a 17th-century English physician and scientist who became the first to document the deliberate addition of sugar for the production of sparkling wine. The Champenois would have us believe that Dom Perignon invented the genre in Champagne in the late 1600s, but superior bottle-making technology means we Brits got there long before.

Roll on to the modern era, and you will find that New Hall in Essex were the first to plant Pinot Noir and Chardonnay in 1984. Nyetimber planted Pinot Meunier as well to complete the trio of Champagne grapes in 1988, produced their first wine in 1996 and have never looked back. What has happened? Why the seemingly sudden interest in planting vines and producing English wine, especially English sparkling wine? Is it climate change? The simple answer is yes.

Stephen Skelton MW, the leading expert on soil in English vineyards, explains. "Before the 1990s, natural alcohol levels at harvest were between 5% and 8%, seldom higher. Since 2000, there has rarely been a year when they have been under 10%. In 2018 - admittedly an amazing year for UK growers - still Chardonnay wines were made with 13.5% alcohol, all natural.

"The area under vine is currently 3,250 hectares (I hectare = 2.47 acres), with Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier comprising 2,194ha, or 67.5% of the total area. Three-quarters of English wine production is now sparkling.

"There are, however, drawbacks in making sparkling wines - lower yields, the extra equipment, and, most importantly, the additional capital and time required, but long-term, the wait is worth it, as the

world-class quality of so many English sparkling wines shows."

The year 2018 was a totally exceptional one, seeing an early harvest produce 13m bottles (2.5 times the average) and 2019, recently harvested, is also a high-quality year with less volume. So the million-dollar question is: who is going to drink all this wine? Retail prices range from £17 to £45, Champagnes sales are falling in the UK, and the US has imposed 25% import tax on French sparkling wines. Will we see Champagne being discounted in 2020? Will we see English sparkling wines coming down in price as supply outstrips demand? I think the answer to both questions is yes.

We are surrounded by English vineyards - Biddenden, Chapel Down, Herbert Hall, Hush Heath and Gusborne are all on our doorstep - and the community shop stocks the Biddenden fizz, so please try and support them if you can. Tracy Claridge

Good taste

The latest village wine tasting was, by popular consensus, the best yet, with Luis Marculeta of Rioja Vega presenting an impressive raft of wines to a packed house at Iden Green Pavilion.

Tickets sold out in double quick time, with many of our drinkers no doubt seeking out traditional full-bodied reds for their Christmas table, but there were surprises in store as well.

The entry level Rioja Blanco proved a real hit, but the Tempranillo Blanco was a cut above, showing a complexity beyond its price bracket. Likewise the late-harvest, oak-aged Chardonnay that closed proceedings, but, sure enough, the reds shone through, from the popular Tinto via the over-performing Crianza to the hearty 2012 Gran Reserva.

Details of the next will appear on these pages. In the meantime, Rioja Vega's Blanco 2018, Crianza 2016 and the late-harvest Chardonnay will soon be available in the community shop.

Benenden Wine Committee



If I recall correctly, the last time I made a new year's resolution was about 25 years ago. I was working in an office in London and everyone seemed to make resolutions back then, and so under pressure I decided mine should be to get fit. As we all had a corporate gym membership I had no excuse whatsoever, which was a challenge as I loathe exercise programmes. Very happy to swim some serious lengths in a pool, not a problem getting out onto the tennis court, can walk for Britain ... but an exercise

programme?!

Anyhow, I can categorically say that I did not stick to it and the resolution floundered. However, I have decided to make one for 2020 which I shall stick to - and that is to make a considerable effort to garden in a way that is more sustainable and kinder to our environment. It sounds like a bunch of buzzwords now, but this is one that is here to stay and we each and every one have to do the right thing in whatever way we can. Really, I should have done this years ago and forgotten about getting fit.

Ultimately, it is all about a mindset, whether on a professional or personal level. Once we start to make those small changes then one can feel able to take bigger steps and so change starts to grow exponentially. I remember very clearly whilst studying horticulture at Hadlow College, one of my lecturers had an understandably commercial viewpoint on plastics, chemicals, peat and water use; unless you use peat in your growing medium, use a new plastic pot or tray for potting-on rooted

fairly swiftly as your plants fail to grow uniformly or just wither and die.

On a domestic level, though, there is no reason why gardeners could not start to propagate more of their own stock at home. Division of perennials and grasses is easy to follow in a good book (I'd be wary of advice online) and many plants can be grown from seed; striking cuttings for hedges and shrubs is not rocket science although admittedly not all are easy subjects; the point is we do not need to buy so many new plants.

We can still buy plastic, but I would make sure it's the durable kind - and ideally I would seek alternatives. I have avoided peat for years (difficult because it is an excellent growing medium) but you can find alternatives if you cannot make your own compost. And don't forget how useful a bag of sharp sand is - both in adding grit to a soil medium and for rooting cuttings. Even seed germination does not require any nutrition, so spent compost mixed with sharp sand would be a perfect starter.

I will leave my thoughts on chemical use to another month, but suffice it to say we can manage without them and it will give your garden wildlife a chance to restore its food chains and your soil a chance to return to its natural balance of microbial activity.

Wishing you all a positive January and a chance to redress some balance and thoughtfulness in our gardens.
